Lieutenant.
His first

teaching job on Long Island was at Amityville

High School, taking over the position of wrestling coach from the "Hall of Famer", Lonnie Kittle. In 1949, Valla and another "Hall of Famer", Cliff Clark, from Bay Shore High School, re-established the Suffolk County Wrestling Championship that had been suspended from 1943 to '48. They also helped to organize the first New York State Interscholastic Wrestling Championships in 1963.

During his tenure at Amityville, Joe Valla's teams compiled an outstanding record of 181 wins - 36 losses - 2 ties,

for a win percentage of 84%. One of the high-lights of his coaching career came in January of 1955 when his team stopped Sprig Gardener's, Mepham High School win streak at 130 by a score of 17-16.

From 1948 to '63, Valla's teams won six Suffolk County Team Championships and finished second, eight times. Valla produced 149 county place winners, 75 county finalists, 40 county champions, 20 league champions, and 13 Long Island champions.
